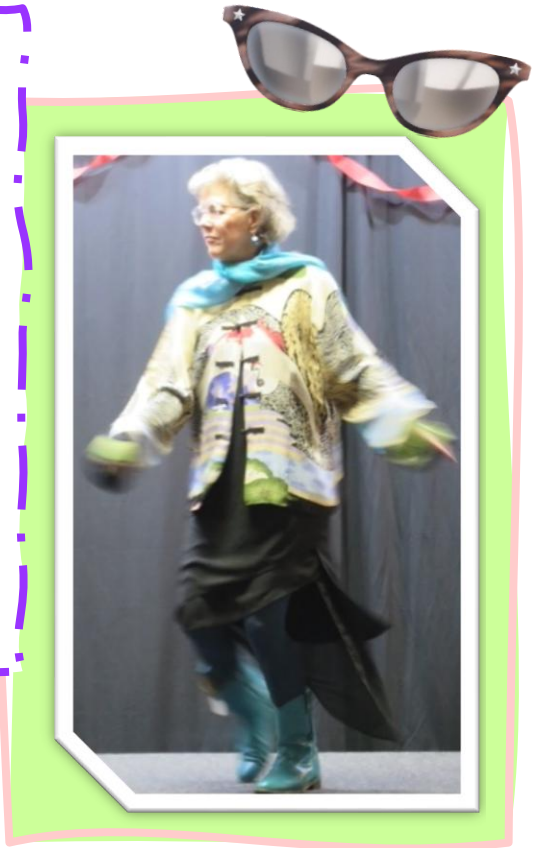

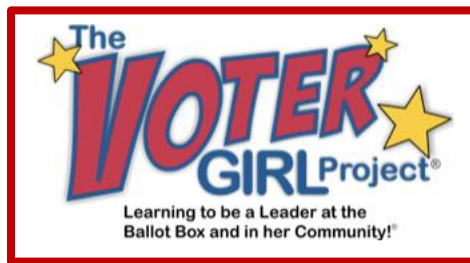

The League of Women Voters' Nonpartisan Legacy

- I recently pitched **League of Women Voters** membership to a millennial lamenting how powerless he felt in this political climate
- He forcefully replied, "It's impossible to be nonpartisan these days! That's totally unrealistic!"
- It's true that our hyper-partisan culture has gotten progressively worse over the last decade, and nonpartisanship may be viewed with suspicion by both sides.
- I'm frequently challenged by people questioning how I, an outspoken feminist, can pursue women's rights within the confines of the League's nonpartisan mandate when one party's record is verifiably less favorable to women's equality than the other.
- After the last federal election, a friend indignantly texted, "How can the League remain nonpartisan when states are toying with executing women who have abortions? We can't stand on the sidelines!"
- I agree – we can't. And we don't.
- What is not well understood is that the League is a highly political organization, advocating for policies and legislation that advance an inclusive democracy – no matter which party supports or opposes them.
- We chase the cause and not the actors, not supporting or opposing political parties or candidates.
- Instead, we support or resist political actions.
- Admittedly, this can get confusing when party lines are drawn around issues, creating the potential to offend either political party at any given juncture.
- A biography of Alice Paul, titled "Claiming Power" by J.D. Zahniser and Amelia R. Fry, has deepened my understanding of the League's nonpartisan roots.
- Alice was one of the leaders who took women's suffrage over the finish line to become the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.
- The book traces Alice's feminist training in London under Emmeline Pankhurst to the streets of Washington D.C.
- Originally a leader in the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA), she then formed a competing organization to engage in more militant strategies to secure women's voting rights.
- She eventually founded the National Woman's Party (NWP), with the goals of holding the party in power responsible for the roadblocks to suffrage and withholding support from any party that didn't support suffrage.
- Since a Democratic president and Congress stood in the way of women's voting rights, Alice's organization launched full-scale opposition to all Democratic candidates in 1916, whether or not they individually supported women's suffrage.
- In other words, she held the whole party responsible, no matter how individual politicians voted. She insisted it was not a partisan act – she would have gone after any party standing in the way.

- Women of both parties joined her picket lines in front of President Wilson's White House.

The League of Women Voters' Nonpartisan Legacy

- The president of NAWSA, Carrie Chapman Catt, was horrified by NWP's tactics.
- Suffrage had always been a nonpartisan cause, and NAWSA aligned itself with pro-suffrage politicians of both parties.
- Being nonpartisan was important to the movement because partisan politics was considered "dirty business," rendering women "unfeminine." (Heaven forbid!) And NAWSA had suffered repercussions in the 1890s after aligning with a political party (Populist) that later faltered.
- Catt did, however, publicize each candidate's position on suffrage and "recommended" suffrage candidates to voters.
- This was not the first time, nor the last, a social movement split due to a difference in strategy.
- Single-minded in their goal to secure the vote for women, activities of both groups bordered on partisanship at various times. The cause overrode party and candidate.
- Catt went on to found the League in 1920 to help women use their right to vote in their own self-interest.
- Three years later, recognizing that voting rights were not enough to ensure fair and equal treatment of women in our nation, Alice Paul proposed the still-elusive 24-word Equal Rights Amendment.
- Through more than one century of advocacy, the League has remained bound by its nonpartisan mandate — stricter now than our foremothers' interpretation.
- While members might have personal partisan affiliations, when serving in an official capacity, they must honor their obligation to nonpartisanship in words and deeds. It's what makes the League credible and sustainable through shifting partisan alliances.
- The League proves people can work together on a mutual goal, such as women's equality, regardless of political affiliation.
- Those who want to work together to build a more-inclusive democracy, regardless of party or gender, should join their local League of Women Voters.

Our Democratic Right to Vote , by MJ LaBelle



- ☑ Recently I was interviewed by KCIW regarding the League of Curry County, our philosophy, our Candidate Forums and our Informational Forum with the Secretary of State. They requested that I speak on SAVE and voter suppression. This is part of what I shared.
- ☑ Voter Suppression and Manipulation are tools to deny or discourage our Democratic right to vote. When pre-voting suppression does not work, then comes the post-voting activity from vote deniers: the machines aren't working, the vote workers are stuffing the ballots or ripping up votes. This is the administration's attempt to weaken our democracy.

Current pre-vote voter suppression:

1. Change the date-stamping of the USPS, hoping no one will notice and mail in votes that may arrive too late to be counted.
2. Save America Act: US and OR Leagues oppose. Makes it more difficult to register to vote, especially for people of color, women and the disenfranchised citizens.

Recent vote manipulation:

- ☑ Partisan redistricting. The **LWV** has taken a stand against redistricting. It was interesting to note that when Texas redistricted, California responded the same, leaving the end result in question.
- ☑ The interview went on and I requested people to join LWVCC and help us get those votes in.

LWVCC History Article - Family Violence Study by Lucie La Bonte

Perhaps the most difficult study the **League of Women Voters of Curry County** did was the Family Violence Study. If it weren't for Past **LWV Curry County** President Linda Stagg Brown, it would have not been completed.

She and I were serving on the **LWVOR** Board at the time, writing the **LWVOR Voter** and members were looking into Family Violence in Curry County. Perhaps the most shocking interview for me was with an unnamed officer of the Brookings Police Department. This officer was spending 24-7 dealing with family violence in Brookings. That was his job. The County had lost a Sheriff Officer who responded to a family violence incident.

The County had a person dedicated to Family Violence on the County payroll. I should say her position's funding was not steady and had to be advocated for. She was amazing and her work was heart-wrenching. What the **LWV Curry County** found was that Curry County had an extremely high rate of family violence per capita.

As the study went on, two of our members who had been victims; did a lot of the research. It was a good team and sometimes it had to be explained that we could not put emotions into the study, just facts. Linda Stagg Brown stayed the course in getting the study put together over rough waters. When the study was completed, our league took positions by consensus.

A note: We learned to write our positions so they could be used over time. They were written carefully so they could be used in many situations. If someone needs the **LWV Curry County** to step up to Elected Officials and read the positions, they just need to contact our President, who is the spokesperson for the league.



Eye on Salem: Legislative Session Recap



The following bills of interest to the League and local voters passed in the Legislature and are awaiting the governor's signature:

- ◆ **HB 4075: Bailout for Bay Area Hospital**—this bill, championed by State Representative Boomer Wright, approves a \$44 million loan from the state's unclaimed property and estates fund to relieve pressure on the hospital.
- ◆ **HB 4134: Transient lodging tax**—this bill increases the tax on short-term lodging from 1.5% to 2.75% and applies the revenue toward conservation efforts.
- ◆ **SB 1525:** establishes a **Blue Economy Task Force**—our own Christine Moffitt followed this proposal, which would create a means for the state to study and report on economic development plans or strategies for the coastal economy.
- ◆ **HB 4102:** changing the authorities of the Oregon **Department of Environmental Quality**—it would allow DEQ to hire third-party contractors to speed up environmental permitting. LWVOR opposed.
- ◆ **HB 4148: LOCAL Act**—would change the ways funds from transient lodging taxes are used; it would allow cities to use more of these funds for infrastructure. An amendment was added allowing the funds to be divided 50/50 between tourism and infrastructure.
- ◆ **HB 4127: Medicaid reimbursements to reproductive health care providers**—allows qualified providers (i.e., Planned Parenthood) to receive reimbursements for services from state funds if the federal government fails to reimburse.
- ◆ **HB 4149: Homeless Assistance Act**—directs school districts to enroll homeless students and provide services for them. Because of cuts to the U.S. Dept. of Education, federal funding for that assistance is uncertain.
- ◆ **HB 4145: Implementing gun safety initiative**—this bill, purportedly about implementing Measure 114, passed by the people in 2022, was gutted before passage.
- ◆ **SB 1509: Uniform Faithful Presidential Electors Act**—seeks to strengthen Oregon's laws requiring that presidential electors vote in the Electoral College consistently with the vote of the people of the state.

The following bills were left in committee without a vote, effectively killing them:

- ◆ **SB 1584: Salmon credit pilot program**—would establish a program in the Coquille and Coos watersheds to encourage voluntary restoration of salmonid habitat. Versions of this same measure have been opposed by LWVOR in the past.
- ◆ **HB 4143: the Recourse Act**—a state funding bill proposing a means to address federal support being withheld. LWVOR is cautious about the approach taken in the bill.
- ◆ **SB 1592: Open Primary**—would have changed Oregon's Primary Election laws to allow any registered voter to vote for any candidate, regardless of party. A joint resolution, HJR 201—that would create an open primary with the top 2 candidates moving on regardless of party—was proposed and will probably be revived in 2027.

Here We Go Again

Campaign Finance Reform

Oregon has a long and frustrating history with campaign finance reform. The first effort on the issue happened in 1908! And it has come up over and over more recently. About 70% of Oregonians routinely vote in favor of campaign spending limits.

So why don't we have meaningful campaign finance laws? You can blame the Legislature, which has blocked or defanged them over and over. And in this year's short session, they did it again.

Here's the recent history: In 2024, there were two campaign finance reform initiatives making their way to the November ballot. One—cosponsored by the League of Women Voters—was IP 9, led by the Honest Elections group; the other was proposed by a coalition of labor organizations.

Both seemed likely to make it to the ballot, so the Legislature acted. They proposed HB 4024, a compromise measure negotiated with the groups behind the two initiatives, and those groups agreed to withdraw their initiative petitions. The bill passed.

But as we have often learned to our sorrow, *passage does not mean implementation.*

- ✎ In 2025, the Legislature failed to either resolve some of the confusing aspects of the bill or allocate the funds necessary for the Secretary of State's office to fix technical issues with the ORESTAR system that would accommodate changes in campaign donation reporting rules.
- ✎ In the 2026 short session, HB 4018 was introduced intending to fix the issues. But House Speaker Julie Fahey worked behind the scenes with labor groups, leaving out the good-government organizations like the League, and just before the bill went into committee, she introduced changes that would create massive loopholes in the rules.
 - ↪ **Legal spending limits would be doubled.**
 - ↪ **A provision spelling out "coordinated expenditures" was removed.**
 - ↪ **Donors could create multiple LLCs and donate the maximum to each.**
 - ↪ **Allowances for in-kind contributions were increased.**
 - ↪ **The requirement to disclose original sources of funds was delayed until 2031.**

All these changes would make the campaign finance law toothless—and there still isn't enough money for the SOS to replace the aging ORESTAR system. HB 4018 passed the Legislature, so if the Governor signs it, it seems likely we will have to start all over again with a new initiative petition for real campaign finance reform—and not believe the Legislature again when they claim to be on board with it. A last-minute measure, known as SB 1502 Enrolled, was passed that directs the Secretary of State to draft a bill with necessary campaign finance improvements for the 2027 legislative session, but it is unknown how that would change the landscape on this issue.

- ▶ Our League can send two voting delegates, and any member is welcome to attend for the workshops and keynote speaker.

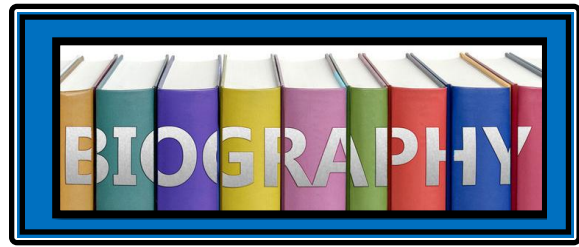
