State League Adding Staff

LWVOR is adding staff in order to increase its capacity to serve local Leagues and the community.

- Thanks to a grant award, current interim staffer Lindsay LaPlante is coming on to work on membership issues and lead Vote411 for the state.
- The League is in the last stages of hiring a Communications and Marketing Coordinator.
- In March, it will be a Development/Fundraising Coordinator.
- And soon, there will be a paid Youth Outreach Coordinator.

Until now, except for Communications, these roles have been filled primarily by volunteers. These staff roles will support local Leagues' activities and increase League outreach into new communities.

1987 Land Use and the Curry League – Lucie Giampaoli La Bonte

My husband Peter Giampaoli and I moved to Curry County in 1984 and built a house up at Cape Ferrelo. We joined the Cape Ferrelo Fire Department after winning a ¼ of a beef. We didn't eat beef at the time but attending a meeting we found an older population crew of fire fighters. Three had just had hip replacements.

Two of the women in the department, Joan Straube and Carolyn Fargo, convinced me to go to a Commissioner's Meeting in Harbor. They were members of the **League of Women Voters of Curry County** and on the Board. The Curry league at the time had adopted a Land Use Study. The Curry County Commissioners had refused to approve a Land Use Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance.

There were large areas of land owned by old families that were designated "Unbuildable" that they had planned to develop. Some land was designated "ranchland" even though it had never been used to graze cows or sheep. Some land had been divided to one acre parcels up in areas like Cape Ferrelo to build housing developments.

The plan had been to pipe water over the hills from the Chetco River. However, before development occurred, that portion of the river was designated "wild and scenic" which stopped that plan. People had to develop wells to build houses. A group out of Salem, 1000 Friends of Oregon, had sued the County. A building moratorium was in place until the commissioners approved a Comprehensive Plan. (Peter and I were able to build because he had put in the septic and well before the moratorium.)

I went to the hearing. The League was concerned about a trailer park owner who wanted to put a septic system in close proximity to the Brookings water intake on the Chetco River. Quietly, the City Attorney, John Babin, had asked the **LWVCC** for help. The three commissioners, Commissioner Rocky McVay, Commissioner TV Skinner and Commissioner McKenzie were having a hearing.

The City of Brookings had appealed the application having failed to stop it at the Planning Commission level. McKenzie also owned an RV Park on the other side of the river, so he had to recuse himself from making a decision. The Commissioners heard the information and continued the hearing. Peter and I both joined the **LWVCC**.

Peter asked Hydrologist Tom Buqo if he could do a hydrology report to show the impact of a failed septic system to the water of the City of Brookings. A report was presented.

In the end, McVay rejected the report because there was nothing in the Comprehensive Plan that protected the water source and the distance was not close enough for state regulations to kick in. (DEQ Regulations were 250ft and the septic field was around 500 feet away). However, he was impressed with our efforts and found a way to vote against the application that complied with the ordinances. Skinner voted "for" and with a tie the application was rejected and could not be resubmitted for several years. Thus began Peter and my involvement with the **LWV Curry County**.



League Joins 724 Other Groups in Opposition to DHS Rule Change

- ⊗ The Department of Homeland Security is proposing to eliminate (without immediate replacement) a 2022 DHS “public charge” regulation.
- ⊗ The 2022 rule clarifies what factors allow the government to determine that a person is “primarily dependent on the government for subsistence,” and is based on a substantial body of case law.
- ⊗ **LWVUS** believes that the elimination of this rule would remove guardrails that prevent DHS from denying lawful permanent residency status based on any family member’s use of any government-funded health or social services program.

Initiative Challenges Oregon Vote-by-Mail

-  An initiative petition is circulating aimed at ending Oregon's vote-by-mail system and replacing it with in-person elections on a single day. The measure, which would take effect as an amendment to the Oregon Constitution, would also change registration, counting, and ballot validation procedures.
-  Proposed by Ben Edtl, Michaela Hammerson, and Stephen Joncus, Initiative 37 is titled *Amends Constitution: Prohibits vote-by-mail elections; registration requires "proof of citizenship"; voting requires "valid" photo identification*.
-  If it qualifies for the November 2026 ballot and passes, this proposal would take effect immediately.

The League of Women Voters believes that vote-by-mail is a secure election system that maximizes citizen participation in elections.

This is the complete text:

AN ACT

Relating to elections; amending the Constitution of the State of Oregon to prohibit vote by mail.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:


Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Oregon is amended by adding the following new section:

Article II, Section 25. Election Procedures

1. All elections held within the State of Oregon shall occur on a single day, designated as Election Day.
2. Voting shall be conducted in-person by those individuals who have registered to vote prior to Election Day, with the exceptions of verified absentee voters. Persons seeking to register to vote must provide proof of citizenship and other qualifications to be an elector.
3. Electors shall present valid photo identification at the time of voting. Provisional ballots may be issued where necessary. Electors may seek an absentee ballot with presentation of valid photo identification.
4. All voting shall utilize paper ballots. Completed ballots shall be maintained under a chain of custody. Each precinct shall hand-count all ballots of electors present at the polling locations by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, under the observation of appointed witnesses.
5. The general biennial election shall be a state holiday.
6. After each election, counties shall maintain a chain of custody for all completed ballots, which shall be archived at the county level, and made available free of charge to the public in an electronic format, without redaction, including the tallied results, the voter roll, and identification of voters who cast votes.
7. The rolls of electors for each county shall be locally controlled at the county level with provisions to identify and delete duplicate registrations of the same elector in more than one county.

Section 2. This amendment shall be effective upon approval by the voters.

Vote Differently in 2026!

-  The U.S. Postal Service last summer issued a statement that effective late in 2025, it would no longer postmark mail as of the date it is submitted to the postal system; instead it will postmark mail on the date the Postal Service processes it. Read the statement [here](#).
-  What does this mean for mail-in ballots? Another change in the past few years meant that most mail is trucked to a central facility before it is postmarked, instead of being postmarked at a local post office when it is accepted. In Oregon, that central facility is in Portland.
-  During the past few elections, most ballots mailed in Coos County cities have carried Portland postmarks and have taken up to 5 days to arrive at the Elections Office in Coquille. The change in postmarking policy means that ballots put into the mail several days before Election Day might not get postmarked until after Election Day, and therefore would not be counted under Oregon law, which states that only ballots postmarked by Election Day can be counted if they are received by the Elections Office up to a week afterward.

Here's advice for ensuring that your ballot is counted, in ascending order of reliability:

-  **Vote early.** If you plan to use the Postal Service to deliver your ballot, put it in the mail at least a week before Election Day. Your mail-in ballot must be **postmarked by Election Day** and it **must be received at the Elections Office within one week after Election Day**. The US Postal Service now postmarks mail on the day it is processed, not when received and Curry County mail is processed in Portland.
-  **Drop boxes are safer.** Every city in Curry County has a drop box. You can find their locations [here](#). Drop boxes are emptied frequently by elections staff and any ballot placed in a drop box before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day is considered to have been voted in a timely manner.
-  **Deliver your ballot in person.** You can vote in person or deliver a sealed and signed ballot at the Curry County Elections Office, 92821 Ellensburg Avenue, Gold Beach.



Win for Oregonians: Judge Dismisses DOJ Lawsuit Seeking to Seize Private Voter Data – Date: January 27, 2026 – Source: Campaign Legal Center



EUGENE, Ore. — On January 26, 2026, a federal judge dismissed the U.S. Department of Justice’s (DOJ) lawsuit seeking Oregon’s complete voter rolls, which contain Oregon voters’ private information. States, not the federal government, administer elections, including ensuring their voter rolls are up to date. Campaign Legal Center, alongside the Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law and the ACLU, submitted an amicus brief [here](#) in November 2025 on behalf of the League of Women Voters of Oregon and the ACLU of Oregon arguing that the DOJ’s actions undermine the freedom to vote and voter privacy.

- “This is a clear victory for Oregon voters and for the principle that our personal information should not be treated as a federal free-for-all,” said **Mark Kendall, president of the League of Women Voters of Oregon**. “The court’s decision affirms Oregon’s strong privacy protections and sends an important message: Safeguarding voters’ private data is essential to maintaining trust in our democratic system. The League is proud to stand with Oregonians in defending these rights.”
- “This ruling reinforces a fundamental principle for voters everywhere: Our democracy depends on protecting people’s personal information from unnecessary government intrusion,” said **Caren Short, director of Legal and Research for the League of Women Voters**. “By rejecting this attempt to compel states to hand over sensitive voter data, the court affirmed that voter privacy is not optional and cannot be overridden by federal overreach. The League is involved in several similar cases around the country and will continue to fight to protect voters, their data and our democracy.”
- “The dismissal of the Justice Department’s case is a victory for Oregon voters’ privacy and for free and fair elections,” said **Eileen O’Connor, former attorney in the Civil Rights Division of the Justice Department and Brennan Center senior counsel**. “States administer their elections, not the federal government.”
- “Protecting the freedom to vote also means protecting voters from unnecessary government intrusion into their private lives,” said **Theresa J. Lee, senior staff attorney with the ACLU Voting Rights Project**. “Voters participate when they feel safe, respected and protected, and this decision affirms that voter privacy is not negotiable. While the DOJ continues to attack voter privacy, we’ll be defending it at every turn.”
- “This decision is a win for the rule of law, our constitutional structure and, most importantly, Oregonians,” said **Brent Ferguson, director of Strategic Litigation at Campaign Legal Center**. “The DOJ should be working to enforce hard-fought voter protections, not trying to abuse its power to force states to hand over the sensitive and personal information of their voters. Recent actions by the DOJ endanger Americans’ freedom to vote and trample on election processes entrusted to the states. This victory affirms the power of Oregon and other states across the country to regulate and administer their own elections without improper overreach by the executive branch.”

Our democracy is strongest when every eligible voter can meaningfully exercise their freedom to vote, and Campaign Legal Center, the **League of Women Voters of Oregon**, ACLU of Oregon and the Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law are working together to protect that freedom.


