The Coupon Book Project has three city coordinators: Charlie Alexander in Port Orford, Elaine Lortscher in Gold Beach and Genevieve Leary in Brookings. They have worked with several League members to sign up more than 30 merchants with more registrations coming in. Our book is going to run to about 35 pages and the discounts are really worthwhile. There are about a dozen restaurants offering everything from 10% or 15% discounts to free desert to \$5 off per entree.

The variety is amazing: furniture stores, dog grooming services, computer repair shops, gift shops, jewelers, auto repair shops and oil change services. The list goes on and on.

The books will sell for \$25 for the first copy and \$20 for each additional book in the same order. You will have no trouble saving at least twice that amount on services that you really want to buy.

In addition to having a grand time at the July 4 parade, the Port Orford Unit has had a table at that town's Saturday Market, last Sundays of June and July with one scheduled for August 31. Anyone who follows legislative activity knows the level of influence that the League of Voters has. People respect our opinions even when they disagree. They understand that we know what we are talking about. It is not because we are smarter than everyone else. It is because we follow a tried and true methodology.

Whenever a League makes a public statement on an issue it must be based on a formal position that has been adopted by a League at the National, State or Local level. Moreover, that position must be based on one or more impartial studies conducted by one or more Leagues. The fact is that we know what we are talking about because we <u>always</u> do our homework.

Following our long tradition of nonpartisanship, all studies are impartial. We do not start with a preconceived agenda. We study all aspects of an issue by involving all interested parties. We then publish a report of our findings. Only after we have studied the issue do we consider taking one or more positions based upon our findings. When we testify before a legislative or administrative body we have the data in our study to back up our position. In truth, much of our League's reputation comes from the quality of our studies.

So when you hear of a study committee, be it local, state or national, that is looking for members you should know that your participation will be highly valued. You will be joining a team of bright and inquisitive individuals who are dedicated to taking an impartial look at one or more issues facing our society. You will learn a lot, you will be doing valuable work and you will have a good time doing it!

Two new studies have been approved by our State League and two more are being done by the Curry County League. The State studies are "Children at Risk" and "Public Postsecondary Education." The Curry County studies are "Home Rule Charter" and "Land Use Planning and Zoning." Information on these studies, including who to contact if you want to get involved, follows on this and Page 5.

RESTUDY OF CHILDREN AT RISK

At the 2011 LWV of Oregon (LWVOR) biennial Convention, members voted to adopt a restudy of our Children at Risk position for 2011-2013. The study was then postponed and readopted at the 2013 LWV of Oregon biennial Convention for 2013-2015.

Scope: A two year study to research all governmental agency programs and services for at risk children, ages zero to third grade. The legislature is currently changing the Oregon Commission on Children and Families and establishing a new state prevention services for children agency, under the education umbrella. Services could include child care, preschool education, health care, mental health, child welfare, and family preservation.

Work Outlook: A state committee will gather information on those statewide programs and services currently available and send an educational update to local leagues. Local Leagues will interview local providers and/or conduct an educational program, to provide feedback to the state committee. RESTUDY OF PUBLIC POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

At the 2013 LWV of Oregon (LWVOR) biennial Convention, members voted to adopt a restudy of our Public Postsecondary Education position for 2013-2016.

Scope: Review our Public Postsecondary Education position with the idea of changing or deleting points that are no longer valid or do not make sense in today's world. Examine the unique roles and interrelationships of community colleges, the four-year regional universities and the three comprehensive universities. Examine the governor's plan for a continuum of pre-K through graduate education and examine how the 2013 Legislature considered the role of post secondary education in the continuum. Examine how all the post-secondary levels are funded. Develop comparison criteria and compare Oregon's higher education outcomes with other successful states.

Outlook for Work: A committee will review our current position with an eye for what is relevant today, and research issues that are being discussed or might be in the future. Background materials will be prepared discussing the roles of each institution, the new education plan and how postsecondary education is integrated financially and programmatically in the education continuum. CURRY COUNTY HOME RULE CHARTER STUDY

The LWVCC Home Rule Study Committee studied the proposed Home Rule Charter for Curry County developed by the Fiscal Independence Committee (FIC), a group of concerned citizens. FIC worked on the charter for several months and obtained an attorney to draft it. FIC Committee members wanted to get signatures in support of placing the measure on the ballot in the November election.

The Study Committee discussed the information provided by FIC and concluded that there appears to be some problems with the charter as drafted. Former County Commissioner Georgia was especially helpful. She had material from the Association of Oregon Counties which encourages charters and has a document giving history, status of Oregon Charter counties (through 2005), and a step-by-step guide to developing a charter.

The Study Committee reached the point of preparing to create two pieces for public information: (1) a chart showing how Curry County government would work under the charter versus the current organization and (2) a brief article including a brief history of Home Rule in Oregon along with a comparison of how a charter county operates versus a General Law county (Curry Count's current organization).

With the news that not enough signatures were secured to place FIC's proposed charter on the November ballot, the Study Committee agreed to wait until early 2014 to see what FIC will do. The current Board of Commissioners is also in the process of selecting a committee to work on a charter. Stay tuned. Shirley Nelson chairs this Study Committee. LAND USE PLANNING & ZONING STUDY UPDATE

The League of Women Voters of Curry County has a history of interest, study and involvement in local planning and zoning issues. Between 1989 and 1993 local League members adopted several positions regarding planning and zoning issues. Our League wants to reexamine these issues. Unfortunately, the study chair had to resign. OBSERVER CORPS SEPTEMBER UNIT MEETINGS

The League of Women Voters of Curry County has made a difference in government through the past decades. Observers have been successful in monitoring government bodies, suggesting changes and finding out how government works. Some Curry League members have gone on to become elected officials or served on appointed boards as a result of this experience. Your 2013 Board of Directors believes that it is time to reactivate the Observers Corp. The goal is to place observers at County Commissioner and City Council meetings.

Observers are the eyes and the ears of the LWV at all levels of government. They learn how government works, share their knowledge with the membership and at times action is taken by the LWV or a study is proposed based on what they have learned. Good government is important to our communities. Come to the September Unit meetings and learn about this important function of the LWV. We make a difference!

SUCTION DREDGE MINING IN OREGON

The State Legislature passed and the Governor has signed a bill to limit suction dredge mining in salmon streams in Oregon. The final bill was a compromise with three sections to be implemented over the next three years. Starting in 2014 the number of permits available will be cut to 1/3 of 2012 levels. Miners will be limited to one dredge every 500 feet and operators will no longer be able to leave their equipment unattended. The second portion of the bill directs the Governor's office to lead a new science based suction dredging framework for the legislature's approval in 2015. The goal is to provide better protection for salmon and trout while simplifying the permitting process. The final part of the bill - a five year moratorium on suction dredging in salmon habitat - will go into effect only if the legislature fails to act in 2015 by adopting the Governor's new regulations. The League of Women Voters of Oregon testified in favor of the provisions found in this bill.
