Economic Campaign Meetings

The guest speaker for February Unit Meetings is Julie Schmeltzer who is the Director of Administration and Economic Development for Curry County.

Some of the topics Schmeltzer will cover in her presentation include: the high poverty rates in Curry County, challenges in attracting new businesses to the county, the housing shortage we are facing, Veteran's programs including the new clinic coming to Brookings, and the broadband fiber optic loop. Schmeltzer will discuss the concept of "owning" your community and making the most of it.

She has been working for Curry County in her current position since October of 2014 and besides leading the Economic Development Department is Director of Administration for the County Commissioners and is Manager of the county's Brookings Airport.

The meetings are open to the public which is encouraged to attend and ask questions. The Port Orford meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 9, 1:00pm, at the Port Orford Library. The Brookings meeting take place on Tuesday February 16 at 5:30pm in the Curry Coastal Pilot conference room and the Gold Beach meeting is on Thursday, February 25 at the Fire Hall next to City Hall at 5:30pm.

Governor Brown Announces Two New State Scenic Waterways

First designation of a State Scenic Waterway since 1988

Salem, OR) — Governor Kate Brown today announced the naming of two new State Scenic Waterways. Portions of the Chetco and Molalla Rivers were chosen as rivers that meet the Scenic Waterways Act criteria for outstanding scenic, fish, wildlife, geological, botanical, cultural, and outdoor recreation opportunities.

"Oregon is blessed with a diversity of river systems that richly contribute to our quality of life, and Oregonians value our rivers' importance to our economies, communities, and ecosystems," said Governor Brown. "Stewardship of our rivers is increasingly important as our population grows and our climate changes."

Oregonians voted to establish the Oregon Scenic Waterways Act in 1970 to protect the free-flowing character of designated rivers for fish, wildlife and recreation; protect and enhance scenic, cultural, and natural values; and establish a process and criteria for adding new rivers as scenic waterways. There are 1,150 miles of state scenic waterways on 19 rivers and Waldo Lake. No new scenic waterway has been designated since 1988. The Oregon State Parks and Recreation Commission recommended the Governor's scenic waterways designation of sections of the Chetco River and Molalla River, and adjacent land within a quarter mile of these river sections. The Oregon Water Resources Commission agreed, and approved scenic waterway flow levels in these river sections to protect recreation, fish and wildlife.

Local advisory groups, and the Curry and Clackamas County Commissions, supported scenic waterway designation for sections of the Chetco and Molalla rivers.

(Editors Note: LWVOR, Clackmas and LWV of Curry County leagues supported the designations with letters.)

History of Curry League Highlights Importance of Action

From CoastLines October 1990 edition an article about action taken while the LWVCC spearheaded the LWVOR study "Energy, Ecology, Economics: Oregon Offshore Development Issues" which addressed Marine Mineral Mining being proposed for off of Port Orford.

PROTECTING THEIR SEAS: Port Orford Fishermen take on the Aloha

"The Public Trust Doctrine gives the public the right to access all public navigable waters and protects the public's right to navigations, fishing, and commerce.

Early one recent fall morning, the sea urchin diver left the port at Port Orford to go to his favorite diving hole. When he got there, the mining exploration ship, Aloha, was anchored right over the fishing hole. "Aloha, this is the vessel_____, you are over my fishing hole, please move", called the diver. The Aloha moved. When the Aloha arrived at the next area for exploration, another fisherman called "Excuse me fellows, but you're right where I want to go fishing." The Aloha moved. This went on day after day. The fishermen of Port Orford had decided to fight for their seas.

When the Greenpeace vessel, Rainbow Warrior dropped anchor at Port Orford, the fishermen were apprehensive. They had heard whispers about "endangered species". Many of their friends in the logging industry had warned them about the "environmentalists. But the fishermen had decided they had enough of the regulations handed down by the state and federal government. So they had a fish fry and invited the crew of the Rainbow Warrior. And the crew? They had never before had the public come to help them. Instead of having their meeting back on their ship, the Rainbow Warrior's crew met that night with fishermen on shore. A friendship had been born.

It must have been quite a sight the first night of protest by the Rainbow Warrior - 27 commercial fishing vessels trailing behind. Convinced their action was necessary, the fishermen continued their vigil throughout the time the Aloha plied the southern Oregon waters.

The commercial fishermen are continuing the fight. They will try to get a constitutional amendment establishing a Renewable Resource Development Zone in the state's territorial sea. The amendment it is hoped will be on the 1992 general election ballot. Meanwhile they plan to petition Sen. Bill Bradbury to include "academic research" and "pilot programs" for marine minerals on his draft Senate bill. And, Greenpeace and the fishermen have plans to keep working together to be sure that the fishermen will always have their fishing grounds." 1990 - Pres. Lucie Giampaoli and Ellen Babin - Editor

It turned out even better. After distributing copies of the LWVOR Study to all Oregon state and federal legislators LWVCC past President Ann Ramp headed up a lobby effort lobbying all Gubernatorial candidates and extracted promises to ban marine mineral mining in Oregon waters. SB 499 was signed into law in 1991 by Governor Roberts. At the signing LWVCC Member Phyllis Cottingham was presented with the pen. Later, Rep. Walt Schroder handed me a signed copy of the bill. In 2016, fishermen continue to fish around the protected Marine Reserve they established with a grassroots process. Lucie


