### **Senator Wyden Holds Curry County Town Hall**

Senator Wyden held a town hall meeting in Curry County Saturday of Memorial Day Week-end. It was well attended by Veterans and some league members. Several League issues were brought up during the meeting.

Citizens concerned about river protection in Curry County and possible impacts of proposed hard rock mining in our watersheds were in attendance. Questions were asked about the status of the expansion of the Oregon Salmon Protection Act and what could be done to assist in these efforts. Wyden's response was the need to enhance grassroots efforts. "Create as many options as possible. Recreation and tourism are a big economic multiplier. This is the Oregon outdoor advantage." He is currently working on red tape affecting the tourism industry – improvement in write offs for restaurants for equipment. He says it is important to diversify economy. The craft brew sector is dealing with rules from prohibition days. From growing to processing to restaurants. Wyden believes that all economics tie together.

Concerns were raised about threats to rivers from foreign companies proposing mining. Wyden says he is working for a permanent ban against mineral withdrawal. He held a special meeting regarding the issue in Curry County. People were heard from after meeting. Wyden believes that there is need for grassroots to mobilize, weigh in and let views be heard. His example was how attacks on Internet by US Chamber of Commerce and others got overturned. 11 million people contacted Congress. "Grassroots power can beat special interests. This is what our founding fathers had in mind." Wyden said.

Another topic of concern was about the Choice Program for Veterans. Veterans claimed it is not working. Wyden agreed and is looking into how to fix the program.

Gold Beach Councilwoman Tami Kaufman raised the marijuana banking problem. Wyden said it is an odd situation with the federal government unraveling states decisions. Wyden introduced a bill to fix this problem. He said the US Post Office won't deliver mail with information regarding marijuana. Citizens in states voted for legalization and he believes it should not be overridden by federal laws. He also wants to make Vote by Mail national to increase voting opportunities.

## New Board Member - Anne Morgan



Anne Morgan moved to Gold Beach last fall after spending 30 years in Coos County working as a Family Nurse Practitioner and Nurse-Midwife. Newly retired, she is pleased to have time to spend in local volunteer activities. She is a new member of the League of Women Voters, the Friends of the Library and Friends That Care (the give-away group). Anne grew up in a small town in Eastern Washington in a family that valued

reading, education and conversation. Along with discussions about school activities, their dinner-table conversation often centered on current events. The Huntley-Brinkley Evening News or The News with Walter Cronkite were watched most evenings creating many

opportunities for lively discussions. Anne's father was a newsman for one of the town's daily papers. He abhorred "yellow journalism" and "sensationalism" and instilled in his children the importance of knowing and reporting the facts. She sees the League's approach to studies and projects as consistent with the investigative values that she learned as a child.

Anne has four grown children, all of whom are married and living interesting lives. As often happens when raising a family in a small town, her children left the area to attend college and graduate school and three of them have settled into careers and family far away - Massachusetts, Ireland and Tanzania. She is fortunate that one son returned to Coos County with his family – including two wonderful grandchildren. Her passions include hiking, birding, wild-flower identification and dance. Her quirky hobby is antique sewing button collecting.

Her "brush with history" – sitting with her father in the press core section while listening to John F. Kennedy deliver a speech at Hanford in September of 1963. Following the speech she followed the dignitaries through the line for an official hand-shake with our 35th president.

## **Treasurer Connie Hunter**



Connie is one of ten board members working to found a new community-based nonprofit radio station, KCIW (Curry Coast Community Radio). She is the producer/host of the local government/hot topics Community Conversations radio show. Connie has an office called Community Builders which provides meeting, office space and supplies for nonprofits. Her back ground is of a professional Director of

Development (DD). She currently serves as the DD for a nonprofit started when her nephew, Sgt. John "Kyle" Daggett was killed in Iraq in 2008. She is an active associate member of the Vietnam Veterans of America, and other veterans' groups and wellknown for her veterans' advocacy in Oregon. Her previous employment includes working for the largest community-based mental health center in Arizona, working at the national-international headquarters of Circle K Corporation, Assistant Director of Development for the largest attended arts organization in Arizona, writing and securing the nonprofit status that created the downtown center/marketing destination for Scottsdale as the Executive Director of Marketing, and as the west coast marketing and national product management for a record label which was purchased by Virgin.

Connie is the proud mother of son, Jason, who passed away at age 16 from complications related disease, after they had done a kidney transplant. Jason's legacy is shown in Connie's work in the area of social activism and her creative writing. As a published poet and writer, Connie's writing was influenced by Academy Award winning movie producer, Elmo Williams, who helped her with her first screenplay. Connie continues to advocate for mental health as a member of Curry Community Health's Mental Health Advisory Board; is a staunch supporter of arts and culture as therapy and engines of community/ economic development; and provides grief support for newly bereaved parents, when asked to do so. Her work with college students includes co-coaching the Mendocino Eagles women's softball team with her college instructor/coach/Athletic Director husband, Skip Hunter.

She currently chairs the LWVCC Homeless Resources Committee and is very involved in the effort to eliminate homelessness in Curry County and for our U.S. Military Veterans, nationally. Other projects of note include: working with Dr. Mikel Harry on veterans' projects, doing the kick-off fundraising for a permanent WWII memorial in Wesley Bolin Plaza at the State Capitol in Phoenix (which includes the two center cannons of the U.S.S. Arizona and the U.S.S. Missouri), and fundraising for research to find a cure for paralysis/spinal cord injuries.
