# SPECIAL DISTRICT ELECTIONS VOTER FORUMS APRIL 29, 30 AND MAY 1 PORT ORFORD, GOLD BEACH AND BROOKINGS

A number of candidates have filed for Special District boards, from local Port Commissions to Southwestern Oregon Community College. As usual, our League will hold forums for those running for contested seats. All forums will run from 7:00 to approximately 9:00 p.m.


The **Port Orford** forum April 29 at Port Orford Library will feature three candidates for one Port Commission seat and nine running for four seats on the SOCC Board. Shirley Nelson will moderate. On April 30 in the **Gold Beach** City Hall Council Room there will be two candidates for the Port Commission and the same nine candidates for SOCC. Nelson will moderate this forum, too.

In **Brookings** on May 1 at Chetco Community Public Library a split forum will be held to accommodate nine school board candidates, four Port candidates, two for the Harbor Sanitary District and the SOCC board. Maggie McHugh will moderate. All League members in each town are urged to attend and to help at their respective forums.

### MANAGEMENT OF HEALTH CARE IN CURRY COUNTY - PRESENTATIONS AT APRIL UNIT MEETINGS

Bob Horel, a member of the League of Women Voters of Curry County, will be speaking on the transition from government to nonprofit management of health care at the April Unit Meetings in Port Orford and Brookings. He currently teaches Mathematics at College of the Redwoods in Crescent City and some courses at Southwest Oregon Community College Brookings campus.

A resident of Brookings, Mr. Horel retired several years ago as Warden of Pelican Bay State Prison, the culmination of a 20-year time of service with the prison system. Prior to that, he served as the Program Director for welfare services for the State of California. He will speak for about 20 minutes on the transition from government to non-profit management of the services under the purview of the board he chairs. He will then respond to questions and dialogue on the subject of his presentation.

#### **Sheriff Bishop Speaks at March Unit Meetings**

Curry County Sheriff John Bishop spoke to each of our three units during March. His talks covered the basic facts of his job: he is elected by the people and answerable to them, not the County Commissioners or any other body. The office of sheriff has a long history dating back to England in about 500 AD. More than 68 Oregon statutes describe the duties of a sheriff and what is mandated.

Though the talk was similar in all three locations, the questions varied widely. In Port Orford and Gold Beach they were more general, referring back to his speech; in Brookings there was much concern about guns and possible regulations or taking guns away from citizens.

In Gold Beach much of the conversation concerned medical costs, salaries, the number of positions in the past and present in the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff did emphasize the differences between City Police and the Sheriff office. A City Police Chief is under the City Council and manager whereas the Sheriff runs their department as an Elected Official and County Commissioners only control the funding. The differences in responsibilities were also emphasized. Only counties can declare emergencies and they are responsible for the jails. Cities use these services but only the taxes from the County share of property taxes are used as match to state and federal funding to keep the jail.

About forty-five people attended the Port Orford unit meeting, twenty-seven in Brookings, and fewer in Gold Beach.

#### CHANGES MADE TO LWVOR COASTAL AND NEARSHORE MANAGEMENT POSITION

Below are the passages that have been added to the Coastal and Nearshore Management position of the League of Women Voters of Oregon, 1990. All Units of the League of Women *Voters of Curry County participated in the study which resulted in these 2013 additions:* 

The League of Women Voters of Oregon supports uniformity of regulations governing the coastal management zone, with opportunity for public input. Jurisdictions should have the ability to enhance regulations to better address local conditions. The League supports the development and maintenance of local comprehensive plans and development codes. Funding should be adequate for effective management and enforcement and should come from a variety of sources.

The LWVOR supports the creation and operation of marine reserves and protected areas on the Oregon Coast. Siting and management of reserves should reflect a variety of factors, including habitat, species diversity, fisheries and tourism, with sound science being the most critical. The reserves should have identified goals, continuous funding should come from multiple public and private sources.

The LWVOR supports active research into ocean energy technologies. Research should incorporate evaluation of impacts on marine habitats and the coastal economy. Funding should be from multiple public and private sources. Commercial deployment should be allowed only after adequate scientific research is completed and regulations have been adopted. Monitoring should be ongoing with necessary actions and modifications taken to protect the marine environment. Commercial operations should agree to bear the cost of remediating and restoring any environmental damage.

The LWVOR supports actions to restore and preserve estuaries to assure they function effectively in the long term. Measures could include additional reserves, streamside protection, planting, removal of invasive species, scientific research, restoration, and response to climate change. Funding should be from multiple public and private sources. Estuary restoration should encourage education and volunteer involvement.

The League recognizes that dredging may be necessary to keep deep-water channels open for maritime commerce. Prior to activity, environmental assessments must be completed to ensure protection of habitat. Design and execution should minimize damage to natural habitats.

Recognizing that mining affects water quantity, quality, and habitat, mining practices should be strictly regulated to minimize damage and require restoration. In some instances where preserving water quality and habitat is vital, mining should be banned.
